

An Open Letter to America's Women and Girls:

One hundred years ago, a diverse and ever-expanding group of American women vehemently opposed to the status quo finally saw their message of equality succeed not only in town halls and state capitals but also on the national stage. A seed of discontent planted decades prior had finally grown into tangible movement - the 19th Amendment was ratified. Women organized; they marched, they rallied, they picketed, they petitioned. And they won.

On May 10, the National Archives opens its Washington, D.C. exhibit and nationwide initiative, Rightfully Hers: American Women and the Vote. The initiative honors the millions of women who fought the decades-long battle for the right to vote.

Suffrage activists met implacable resistance, from public mockery to editorial shaming. The opposition included politicians, private citizens, and, for a time, a majority of women. During the final days, some in the nation's capital who dared raise their voices faced violence, intimidation and even imprisonment. But they never let up, organizing campaigns that confronted several decades of national party conventions and showing up in Washington, D.C. to press every single session of Congress until the Nineteenth Amendment was sent to the states for ratification.

Undeterred, these women spoke up on street corners, atop soap boxes, and in domed legislatures.

The result was far from perfect. African American women in the South and women from a broad range of minority groups were left behind, but they continued to agitate for voting rights in the decades to come, many to this very day. The Nineteenth Amendment represented one significant milestone in the ongoing struggle for a more democratic America.

On this anniversary, we salute their courage, their tenacity and their unshakable voices as they fought to participate in democracy. And we salute every woman and girl who stands up, who raises her voice, who will not be cowed in pursuit of her rights.

We see you – in the classroom, the boardroom, the courtroom. We know how brave you are, in factories, in legislative races, in protests, and on sports fields. Each day you set an example for people of every race, creed and gender.

Rightfully hers, rightfully ours, rightfully yours. Let us never fail to be part of the democratic process.
